Mr Geoffrey Cousins is President of the ACF. He is well known as a community leader, businessman, environmental activist and writer. He successfully opposed the Gunns Paper Mill in Tasmania. He founded the Starlight Children's Foundation

in Australia and is currently Chairman of the St James Ethics Foundation.



Leslie Hughes is a Distinguished Professor within the Department of Biological Sciences at Macquarie University and an expert on the impacts of climate change on species and ecosystems. She is a Lead Author on the UN IPCC Fourth and Fifth Assessment Reports; A Councillor of the Australia Climate Council; a Board

member of WWF Australia; and a Board Member of 'One Million Women'.

Mr Kevin Petrini is the UNDP Regional Climate Change Specialist for the Pacific and is supporting the development of a Strategy for Climate and Disaster Resilience in the Pacific. He has worked widely throughout the Pacific most recently

Pathway to Paris: Dec 2015 UN Climate Change Conference

1979: First global climate conference

1990: Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change IPCC releases first assessment report

1992: Rio Earth Summit: UN Framework Convention on Climate Change UNFCC signed

1997: Kyoto Protocol adopted

2005 Kyoto Protocol ratified. Encourages countries to reduce emissions by 5% over the period 2008 - 2012

2007: Australia ratifies Kyoto

2009: Copenhagen accord recognised the scientific view that any increase in global temperature should be kept below 2 deg C. The accord did not commit countries to a binding successor to the Kyoto Protocol.

2012: Doha amendment extending the Kyoto Protocol to 2020; not yet ratified.

2014: UN Climate Summit of world leaders

2014: US-China deal (negotiated in secret) to reduce carbon emissions

2015: Papal encyclical (foreshadowed)

2015: UN Climate Conference, Paris with the goal of:

binding national commitments to limit a global temperature rise to less than 2 deg C

Observations on Climate Change

Global surface temperature: Each of the past three decades has been successively warmer at the Earth's surface than any the previous decades in the instrumental record. There is high confidence that annual mean surface warming since the 20th century has reversed long-term cooling trends of the past 5000 years in mid-to-high latitudes of the Northern Hemisphere (NH).

Sea level rise: It is virtually certain that over the 20th century sea level rose. The mean rate of sea level increase was 1.7 mm per year between 1901 and 2010 and this rate increased to 3.2 mm per year between 1993 and 2010.

Extreme climate: There is high confidence that the intensity of extreme precipitation events will increase with warming, at a rate well exceeding that of the mean precipitation.

Carbon dioxide he distribution of observed atmospheric CO2 increases clearly shows that the increases are driven by anthropogenic emissions that occur primarily in the industrialised countries north of the equator.

Glaciers: There is very high confidence that glaciers world-wide are persistently shrinking.

Ice sheets:There is high confidence that the Antarctic ice sheet has been losing ice during the last two decades.The average rate of ice loss is likely increased from a sea level equivalent of 0.08 mm per year over the period 1992–2001, to 0.40 mm yr–1over the period 2002–2011
