President's Message

The UN Day for Persons with Disabilities was a day to reflect on the achievements of those with disabilities and to focus on support to enable employment. I represented the association at an event held on Dec 3rd to showcase the achievements of those with disabilities and hear about employment strategies and programs. On Wednesday Dec 8th UNAAWA was honoured by a visit from the President of the United Nations Association of Australia, Hon. Professor Robert Hill. Robert presented the annual Human Rights lecture to mark Human Rights Day. This important day is celebrated on December 10th each year. Robert discussed the formation of the United Nations, its expansion to the current 192 states [countries] and the development and importance of conventions. Following the lecture, the President joined the life members and executive for dinner. The newly appointed administration officer to UNAA, Elizabeth Shaw, accompanied Robert. Elizabeth is now studying in Canberra and will work part time for UNAA. I met with Elizabeth on Friday 9th to discuss the work of UNAAWA. Specifically we spoke about the strategic plan, UNAAWA's link with the Australian Immigrant and Refugee Women's alliance and the developing plans for the National Conference. It was a useful meeting to establish a working relationship and gain clarification on a number of issues.

Plans for the National Conference are proceeding. The planning committee is seeking sponsorship for speakers. I am delighted to announce that the City of Perth has agreed to fund the production of CDs to be presented to each delegate at the conference. On the CD, there will be a document outlining the Past Presidents and Life Members of UNAAWA. The conference committee will meet monthly from January.

The Yolande Frank Memorial Committee met this month to decide on the format for the 2011 award. The children of WA will be invited to creatively illustrate article 3 of the Declaration of Human Rights: "Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person". The timeframe for the award will enable the shortlisted entries to be displayed at the conference. A presentation to the winner to take place at the national conference. There is a need to raise money to cover the award prizes and a small function will be arranged in January to raise the \$350 to cover the prize money and presentation book.

I am delighted to announce that long term member of the association Curtis Clark has offered to chair the environment subcommittee of UNAAWA. Curtis would be pleased to hear from any member who would like to join this committee, please leave a message at the office. This committee will focus on environmental issues such as climate change and celebrations for the UN Year of Forests in 2011. Carolyne Gatward continues her work preparing applications for grants. This year applications have been most successful. Grants have been received from Lotterywest to fund the development of the strategic plan and the purchase of new office equipment, the City of Perth has provided funds to cover the production of CDs and Australian Immigrant and Refugee Women's Alliance are funding celebrations for UN Migrant Day 2010 and International Women's Day 2011. Congratulations and thank you to Carolyne for her work on these applications and acquittals.

On December 17th, UNAAWA will present its final function for the year, gathering together Immigrant and Migrant women to discuss their settlement in WA. This event will mark UN Migrant Day.

On behalf of the executive Committee, I wish you all a joyous Christmas and safe holiday season. May the spirit of peace and goodwill enfold you and your family.

Annual Human Rights Day lecture

The annual Human Rights Day lecture was a successful event, with about 50 people attending to hear Professor Robert Hill, current UNAA President, give an address about achieving global justice for all. His address was informative and inspired questions and discussion amongst audience members following the event. He challenged us all to remember that we can all be human rights defenders – that it only takes one person to inspire a movement for change.

Following the lecture, the Executive Committee treated Professor Hill and newly appointed UNAA Executive Administrator, Beth Shaw, to dinner for an opportunity to share ideas and goodwill on such an auspicious occasion.

Taser fact sheet

We have no further response from WA Police regarding their assessment of our Taser fact sheet, although this is not surprising given the current Corruption and Crime Commission investigation into abuse of Taser weapons. The Human Rights committee will compile and keep up to date a folder with information about the use of Taser weapons, including references to websites. Members are welcome to access this information at any time.

Attendance in the community

UNAAWA members continue to be active participants within the local human rights community, attending at public lectures, special occasion events and in writing to local governments regarding local issues.

Aboriginal Elder honoured by the Jewish Community

Many of you will have heard of the great Australian Aboriginal leader, William Cooper, a proud and dignified man. William was singleminded in his fight to empower his people. Age and sickness did not prevent him from his daily activities of walking to the city and standing on a fruit box on the banks of the Yarra River speaking of the Aboriginal issue. In 1932, aged 71, William alongside other Aboriginal Elders formed the nucleus of the then Australian Aborigines League. Some of their most noted actions include: 1938 - "Day of Mourning" Protest - On 26th January 1938, to coincide with the 150 year Celebration of Colonization. 1940 - Declared National Aboriginal Day - now NAIDOC.

His memory has been honoured by the Jewish communities in Sydney and Melbourne in recent years. For those who don't know, William Cooper, in 1938 led an Aboriginal delegation to the German consulate in Melbourne to protest the Nazi persecution of Jews in Germany following *Kristallnacht*. This was at a time when Aboriginal people were denied citizenship rights in Australia and were not even counted as people in the census. William Cooper was not a well man but fought tirelessly for human rights for his own people and for others. He passed away in 1941. In acknowledgement of his stand, Yad Vashem, the Holocaust Museum in Jerusalem, will be opening the William Cooper Memorial Garden in December. His grandson ('Uncle' Boydie Turner) and great grandson (Kevin Russell) are trying to arrange up to 35 potential family and community reps to travel to Yad Vashem for the opening.

UN Day of Remembrance of Victim of the Holocaust

UNAAWA will hold a small memorial service at the Jewish Memorial in Stirling Gardens, Perth on **27 January 2011 at 11am** to remember victims of the holocaust. Leaders and members of the Jewish community will be present and the City of Perth will host refreshments afterwards. UNAAWA thanks Councillor Janet Davidson for her support of this event. Her story is similar in many ways to that of Ayaaan Hirsi Ali, the author of *Infidel*, the book we discussed at the November meeting.
