SCREW Week at UWA

SCREW Week was a series of free, informative and thought-provoking events on the themes of Sex, Consent, Respect, Education and Wellbeing. It is a UWA calendar event in which there is a heavy focus on issues of sexual assault and harassment. One of the crucial aspects of week was the free screening of The Hunting Ground – a documentary on sexual abuse in U.S colleges and the failure of university administrations to properly address it – being shown



in universities across the country as part of a nationwide project.

The University of Western Australia partnered with other universities in a new national campaign entitled 'Respect. Now. Always'. The campaign focused on ensuring that students and staff are safe from sexual assault and sexual harassment. We were very

The weekend long event was held at UWA Innovation Quarter and in partnership with DrawHistory. The event saw teams create and present new and tangible ideas to harness the stories of people facing prejudice and discrimination to promote positive social change, through which they joined the journey to dismantle discrimination through powerful stories. The winning idea was to place a code at historical sites, which passers by could scan with their smartphone and then hear a story about the site from history.
