The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) inaugurated World Teachers' Day in 1994. It commemorates the 5 October 1966 joint signing of the UNESCO/ILO Recommendation on the Status of Teachers. In adopting this recommendation, governments automatically recognised the importance of competent, qualified and motivated teachers in society. Australia celebrates World Teachers' Day on the last Friday in October.

- > Primary teachers
- Secondary teachers

CRITERIA:

- Innovation: How does the pedagogy, program or activity contribute to advancing GCED in the school or a broader context?
- > Implementation: When/how was the innovation implemented?
- > Impact: What was the impact on students and others?

TIMELINE:

- > Entries close 12 September
- Awards presented UN Day Celebrations 25 October

KEY LEARNER ATTRIBUTES

INFORMED AND CRITICALLY LITERATE

- Know about local, national and global issues, governance systems and structures
- Understand the interdependence and connections of global and local concerns
- Develop skills for critical inquiry and analysis

SOCIALLY CONNECTED AND RESPECTFUL OF DIVERSITY

- Cultivate and manage identities, relationships and feeling of belongingness
- Share values and responsibilities based on human rights
 - Develop attitudes to appreciate and respect differences and diversity

ETHICALLY RESPONSIBLE AND ENGAGED

- Enact appropriate skills, values, beliefs and attitudes
- Demonstrate personal and social responsibility for a peaceful and sustainable world
- Develop motivation and willingness to care for the common good
