Asia and Pacific on course to miss all Sustainable Development Goals

Unless progress is accelerated, Asia and the Pacific are on course to miss all of the 17 Goals of the UN's 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, according to the Executive Secretary of the UN regional commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP).

<u>ESCAP</u>'s latest <u>Sustainable Development Goals Progress Report</u> shows that, when it comes to some of the <u>Goals</u>, the region is actually going backwards. These are the goals related to access to clean water and sanitation (Goal 6), decent work and economic growth (Goal 8), and responsible consumption and production (Goal 11).

In a different <u>report</u> by the UN Sustainable Development Solutions Network (SDSN) Australia's performance was ranked as 38th out of 162 countries in terms of progress achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Australia ranked lower than most other OECD nations including New Zealand (11), the UK (12) and Canada (22).

Monash University Professor John Thwaites, who is chair of SDSN for Australia, <u>said</u> this ranking should be a wake-up call showing Australia needed to make big improvements in fairness and sustainability.

Based on trend data available, Australia – along with every other country – is not on track for achieving the SDGs by the UN's target date of 2030.

The UNAA is deeply committed to the education, inspiration, and engagement of Australians around the SDGs and has a clear mandate to increase the Australian support needed to help create a safer, fairer and more sustainable world.

'Preserve, revitalise and promote' indigenous languages, or lose a 'wealth of traditional knowledge', UN chief says

Secretary-General António Guterres underscored the urgency to "preserve, revitalise and promote indigenous languages" in his <u>message</u> for the <u>International Day of the</u> <u>World's Indigenous Peoples</u>.

Noting that a significant proportion of the estimated 370 million indigenous people in the world today "still lack basic rights, with systematic discrimination and exclusion continuing to threaten ways of life, cultures and identities", the UN chief stressed that this contradicts the UN <u>Declaration</u> on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and the <u>2030</u> <u>Agenda</u> for Sustainable Development, "with its promise to leave no one behind".

Offering the UN's support to realize "the rights and aspirations of indigenous peoples", the Secretary-General concluded: "I count on Member States to engage and support indigenous peoples in determining their own development through policies that are inclusive, equitable and accessible".

Aid, Populism and Foreign Policy - address by Marc Purcell, CEO, ACFID

As part of UNAA's distinguished lecture series, earlier this May members had the pleasure to hear firsthand from Marc Purcell on the state of the Australian aid program and his prognosis for the coming years.

Marc is the CEO of the Australian Council for International Development, the peak-body for international aid and development NGOs which brings together over 130 members working in 90 developing countries.

In his wide ranging lecture he set out the important role of foreign aid in Australia's relationships and influence, the development assistance positions of the major political parties, and how the public opinion differs from current foreign aid policy settings.

Following the lecture, members had a rare opportunity to take part in a candid question and answer session and gain further insights from Marc into the state of Australia's development sector and its current engagement with the Australian Government and regional partners.
