

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SECRETARY-GENERAL'S REMARKS AT GENERAL ASSEMBLY CEREMONY MARKING THE 75TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

The ideals of the United Nations – peace, justice, equality and dignity — are beacons to a better world. But the Organization we celebrate today emerged only after immense suffering.

It took two world wars, millions of deaths and the horrors of the Holocaust for world leaders to commit to international cooperation and the rule of law. That commitment produced results. A Third World War – which so many had feared — has been avoided. Never in modern history have we gone so many years without a military confrontation between the major powers. This is a major achievement of which Member States can be proud – and which we must all strive to preserve.

DOWN THE DECADES, THERE HAVE BEEN OTHER HISTORIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS, INCLUDING:

- · Peace treaties and peacekeeping
- Decolonization
- · Human rights standards and mechanisms to uphold them
- · The triumph over apartheid
- · Life-saving humanitarian aid for millions of victims of conflict and disaster
- · The eradication of diseases
- The steady reduction of hunger
- · The progressive development of international law
- · Landmark agreements to protect the environment and our planet

Most recently, unanimous agreement on the Sustainable Development Goals and the Paris Agreement on Climate Change provide an inspiring vision for the 21st century. Yet there is still so much to be done.

Of the 850 delegates to the San Francisco Conference, just 8 were women. Twenty-five years since the Beijing Platform for Action, gender inequality remains the greatest single challenge to human rights around the world. Climate calamity looms. Biodiversity is collapsing. Poverty is again rising. Hatred is spreading. Geopolitical tensions are escalating. Nuclear weapons remain on hair-trigger alert. Transformative technologies have opened up new opportunities but also exposed new threats. The COVID-19 pandemic has laid bare the world's fragilities. We can only address them together.

Today we have a surplus of multilateral challenges and a deficit of multilateral solutions. I welcome the General Assembly's 75th anniversary declaration and commitment to reinvigorate multilateralism. You have invited me to assess how to advance our common agenda, and I will report back with analysis and recommendations. This will be an important and inclusive process of profound reflection. Already we know that we need more — and more effective — multilateralism, with vision, ambition and impact.

National sovereignty —a pillar of the United Nations — goes hand-in-hand with enhanced international cooperation based on common values and shared responsibilities in pursuit of progress for all. No one wants a world government – but we must work together to improve world governance.

In an interconnected world, we need a networked multilateralism, in which the United Nations family, international financial institutions, regional organizations, trading blocs and others work together more closely and more effectively. We also need as the President said, an inclusive multilateralism, drawing on civil society, cities, businesses, local authorities and more and more on young people.

The Secretariat marked this anniversary with a global conversation that reached more than a million people around the world, with a special focus on the voices of youth. They shared their fears and hopes for the future. They said international cooperation is vital to deal with today's challenges. They highlighted that Covid-19 has made such solidarity more urgent. And they stressed that the world needs health systems and basic services for all.

People are fearful about the climate crisis, poverty, inequality, corruption and systemic racial and gender discrimination.



"They see the United Nations as a vehicle to make the world a better place. And they count on us to meet today's tests. That responsibility lies above all with Member States."

Member States established the United Nations and have a duty to embrace it, nourish it and provide it with the tools to make a difference. We owe this to "we the peoples". We owe it to the peacekeepers, diplomats, humanitarian personnel, and others who sacrificed their lives advancing common values.

I salute all staff, past and present, for their dedication in bringing the ideals of the United Nation to life. Our Organization's founders began their work during the heat of conflict. Now it falls to us to chart our way out of danger.

In the words of our Charter, let us "combine our efforts to achieve these aims" as United Nations. Thank you.

We work closely with government, affiliate UN organisations and businesses to help educate Australian citizens and leaders about the UN's vital work and encourage them to become involved in promoting the UN. We are also an affiliate of the Australian Council for International Development (ACFID), a national association of non-government organisations working to promote international development and aid. NATIONAL PRESIDEMT REPORT



It has been an interesting year to say the least but out of adversity comes hope and a platform for change. We believe our role to support the work of the UN is more important than ever and as a very first item, I would like to thank our dedicated teams, volunteers and staff working across Australia. It is always humbling to see the passion, the commitment and vision of so many people from all ages and walks of life committed to making the world a better place. Congratulations to each and everyone of you for a job well done in what we can all describe as very challenging times.

As with most other entities, the UNAA has moved its meetings and events online. With people at home, events have been shared nationally with more opportunity for people to join from across Australia and further abroad. In some areas where restrictions have been lifted and it has been safe to do so, we have been able to host scaled back face to face events, with the social engagement aspect of our events and meetings being so important to our people, members and the community. In areas where lockdown or restrictions remain in place, we have moved to doing things differently and engaging with members through online member meet ups, mailouts and educational webinars.

The UNAA delivered two significant firsts for the organisation this year, launching both its first Reconciliation Action Plan and the UN Alumni Network. We hope to build our activities in these two areas together in the future, with a major aim being to support increasing the voice of and opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples in the UN.

We had planned to have a National Partnership Forum in 2020. The National Partnership Forum was to bring together an international line up of expert speakers including UN sustainability leaders, business leaders, government and civil society to facilitate workshops designed to build partnerships and progress Australia's efforts on the SDGs. Whilst disappointingly we had to defer our National Partnership Forum (which had been fully subscribed and was set to be a major milestone for change and influence of the UNAA) we do look forward to holding a revised National Partnership Forum in April 2021. It is at events such as these that we can all come together and plan and develop a realistic and practical way forward to deal with some of the Australia's most challenging sustainability issues. I would hope to see many of you there, in person or online.

I am also very pleased that the Australian Government has reaffirmed its support and commitment to a rules-based international order, strong United Nations and the importance of multilateralism. We look forward to working closer with the Australian Government to help deliver on the UN's vision and policies.

Once again, I would like to express my gratitude for all the support that the UNAA has received over the last 12 months. As we look forward to 2021 I hope we are able to continue to build our events, programs and activities across Australia in support of the work, goals and values of the UN in a world that needs the UN now more than ever.

This past year has certainly been a very different one and for many, very difficult, as will continue to be the case for years to come. With a global pandemic, unprecedented bushfires across Australia and continued increase in the numbers of displaced peoples, now more than ever the world needs a strong United Nations. In the 75th year of the UN, the role of the UN has perhaps never been more important, in working to support member states in multilateralism and toward global, regional and country solutions to increasingly complex challenges and inequalities.

The UNAA has continued a busy program of events, though since early 2020, moving to online and engaging with our members and the community in different ways. I would like to sincerely thank the UNAA's dedicated volunteers and committed members for your significant contribution and in particular at this difficult time. You make our work possible. Thank you also to our partners, without which the UNAA would not be able to deliver its quality programs, events and activities across Australia.

In October 2019, UNAA launched our Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP). Reconciliation and the rights of Indigenous peoples is an integral value of the UN making the launch of the RAP an important step towards supporting Indigenous peoples in Australia for the UNAA. Under the RAP, we welcomed a new paid staff member, Malachi Murljacic in partnership with the ACT Government and Career Trackers. We will be working to increase the representation and contributions of Indigenous peoples in the UNAA and United Nations more broadly. The UNAA believes in providing a platform for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and is planning more events, round tables and activities to support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices and leadership.

October 2019 also saw the launch of the UNAA's United Nations Alumni Network. The Network is the first of its kind in Australia and with over 300 members, it links past and present Australian UN staff with events and opportunities to promote the importance of the UN. The UNAA would like to thank the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade for its support in creating the Network. We look forward to supporting growing the number of Australians in the UN, in particular in leadership and for women, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and underrepresented groups.

With the onset of COVID-19, our major event 'the UN and Australia Sustainable Partnerships Forum' has been postponed to April 2021. Postponing the Forum comes with the opportunity to reframe the discussions on the importance of the UN and its roles in supporting member states, in particular in the road to recovery following COVID-19. We thank partners for their ongoing support and look forward to seeing you at the Forum, with sustainability and SDG leaders from the UN, across the globe, and in Australian business, civil society, governments, academia and the community.

In the 75th year of the United Nations, now more than ever, it is vital Australia continues in support of the UN toward a safer, fairer, more sustainable world.

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SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS PROGRAM

The UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are an ambitious shared framework of development priorities to 2030. They aim to bring an end to extreme poverty, hunger, and inequality; act on climate change and environmental sustainability; improve access to quality health and education; promote prosperity and well-being for all people; whilst also encouraging good governance, peace, and security.

Achieving the SDGs is one of the UN's highest priorities. The UNAA is committed to the education, inspiration, and engagement of Australians around the SDGs and applies an SDGs focus to its over 150 events each year through our passionate teams and volunteers all across Australia.

This year the UNAA promoted the SDGs at several major events. Highlights included keynote addresses at the National Community Engagement for Infrastructure Forum, the Canberra Urban Regional Futures Annual Forum; SDG panel discussions at Local Communities Services Association Annual Conference in Wollongong and the CQ University Festival of Change SDGs Panel Discussion in Rockhampton; and with a booth at the World Engineers Convention held in Melbourne.




CLIMATE PROGRAM

PROGRAM MANAGER: Graham Hunter

In response to the UN's 2015 Paris Climate Agreement, the United Nations Association of Australia is promoting the development of a national, inclusive climate management framework.

The Paris Agreement requires states to progressively "mobilise stronger and more ambitious action by all stakeholders, including civil society, the private sector, cities and subnational authorities, local governments and indigenous peoples".

In its Managing Climate Change in Australia Position Paper, the UNAA proposes the target of achieving net zero emissions of greenhouse gases by 2050 be adopted throughout Australia and a plan to achieve this across public and private sectors be developed as soon as possible. The UNAA held its annual Post COP Forum, in March 2020, including presentations by the EU Ambassador to Australia and the Australian Ambassador for the Environment who was the Australian Government's chief negotiator at the COP. Each forum was hosted in the offices of the consulting firm, EY.



UN DIPLOMA

PROGRAM MANAGER: Joshua Karras

In collaboration with Williams Business College, UNAA NSW launched its second and third session of the UN Diploma. This course equips its students with the skills needed to effect positive change and help achieve the UN's Sustainable Development Goals. The work of the UN can be utilised by members of the public, business leaders, academic staff and professionals.

The course trains people in the history, structure and operations of the United Nations. Inclusive in this are several competency-based subjects that give the student recognisable skills that can be used in either UNrelated initiatives or in the enhancement of their own career development. UN STUDY TOURS

PROGRAM MANAGER: Sophie Arnold

Each year, the UNAA arranges for a small group of interested Australians to tour UN headquarters in New York and Geneva where they spend a week immersed in meetings, briefings and tours. In October 2019, our group met with senior UN officials and representatives of such agencies as UNICEF, UNDP, UNHCR and UN Women. The group also met newly appointed Australian Ambassador to the UN Mitch Fifield immediately after he had presented his credentials to the UN. These tours increase participants' awareness of the positive role the UN plays in the international community and its contribution to the foreign policy of member States.





UN ALUMNI NETWORK

In October 2019, The United Nations Association of Australia, supported by the Australian Government Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade has launched the United Nations Alumni Network.

The Network is the first of its kind in Australia and works to increase awareness of the UN in Australia and to increase the representation of Australians in the UN, in particular in leadership roles. A key focus is on supporting opportunities for women, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and people from groups which are underrepresented in the UN. The Network connects members to events, job opportunities, and other Australians currently serving or who have served in the UN system.

In May, the UNAA partnered with Monash University for a guest lecture webinar with former UN Under-Secretary-General for Safety and Security, Peter Drennan.

Peter shared his knowledge and experience in the UN and working to the Secretary-General, in particular in the area of crisis response. The event gave the over 280 students who attended practical insights into working in the UN, the important role the UN plays and why this is so crucial in global and regional responses, in particular in response to COVID-19.







2021 SUSTAINABLE PARTNERSHIPS FORUM

Prior to the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, UNAA had arranged a two-day Forum to bring together civil society, governments, business and UN leaders under the theme of building sustainable partnerships to progress the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Unfortunately, this significant event had to be postponed because of restrictions on large gatherings.

With the ongoing support of all our partners, the event has now been redesigned to take place over three days in April and May next year.

On **20 and 21 April** next year, the fully digital UN & Australia Sustainable Partnerships Forum will enable UNAA to bring global speakers and audiences together with current and future Australian SDG leaders. Plenary sessions, interactive breakout discussions and networking opportunities will promote dialogue, connections and ongoing collaboration.

On **4 May**, we will build on the digital Forum by bringing prospective partners together in small group facilitated workshops designed to assess aligned interests and build the foundation for partnerships to promote Australia's contribution to progressing the SDGs.

2020 UN SECURITY - HOW TO DELIVER LIFE SAVING PROGRAMS IN AN INCREASINGLY **HOSTILE ENVIRONMENT**



As conflict and natural disasters persist across the globe the demands on the United Nations to find political solutions, deliver lifesaving humanitarian aid, protect human rights and drive sustainable development continue to grow. Peter Drennan, former Under-Secretary-General of the UN Department of Safety and Security is the highest ranked Australian to ever work in the UN. Speaking in Canberra Peter highlighted that the security environment across the world is not changing, some conflicts have been resolved but too many continue, the impact of crime, corruption and extremism is significant, food insecurity is growing and economic and social disparity drives insecurity, mass migration and nationalism. The challenge for the United Nations, agencies, funds, programs and departments is to 'stay and deliver' but to also keep United Nations personnel safe and secure.



NEW SOUTH WALES

SDG SCHOLARSHIP SIGNING

In partnership with the University of Wollongong (UOW), the NSW Division of the UNAA launched an inaugural undergraduate student scholarship through the generous support of Rotary Club of Sydney Cove. 



MODEL UNITED NATIONS

UNAA Victoria runs Model UNs (MUNs) in schools, universities and workplaces to actively train people in advocacy, debating and global thinking. The UNAA Victoria Model UN is a full-day simulation of



the UN General Assembly during which delegates step into the shoes of ambassadors from around the world and discuss contentious global issues. The aim is to find the best possible solution through dialogue, negotiation and multilateral diplomacy. UNAA Victoria ran 19 MUNs for 1630 participants in first half of the reporting period. In January, UNAA Victoria ran a Model UN as part of the Actions for Earth - Global Youth Summit. First held in Singapore in 2014, this event brought students from across Asia to Melbourne.






GLOBAL CLIMATE ACTION PANEL DISCUSSION

Gavin is an Australian Football League (AFL) legend, acclaimed contemporary Aboriginal artist and passionate supporter of Indigenous empowerment. On 10 December, UNAA Victoria ran its first Model UN for the general community. Held on the 70th anniversary of the UN Declaration of Human Rights, some 60 people debated whether the Declaration needs changing to meet today's world.

JUNE 4 2020

The exhibition attracted both local and international visitors during the Museum's peak summer period. The exhibition was open and free to the public.

SDG FORUM SERIES: 'BUSINESS TRANSFORMATION IN ACHIEVING THE SDGS'

Women retire with almost 50% less than men on average. This is a result of independent choices and a calculated gender pay disparity. It is imperative for women to become educated financially for self-sustainability. The panel also encouraged the idea of championing women both at home and at workplace, calling for them to speak up for change and fight for their own worth.



BLACK LIVES MATTER INTERVIEW WITH INDIGENOUS ELDER, UNCLE BEN TAYLOR



JUNE 28 2020

Two days before the Black Lives Matter rally in Perth, it was an honour to interview Ben Cuimermara Taylor AM, a Noongar Elder and Co-Chair of WA Deaths in Custody Watch Committee, about the plights of indigenous peoples in Australia. A well-known indigenous activist from Western Australia, Uncle Ben, an 81 year old man who spoke passionately as he recounted the story of his life and his struggles to overcome the deep-rooted discrimination he has experienced. He shared his sense of hope and optimism that the protests seen around

the world might open the eyes of all those in Australia who too often choose to look away from the racism and discrimination which still exists today.

UN Youth Australia is a national youth-led organisation that aims to educate and empower young Australians on global issues by providing them with the knowledge and support they need to create change. UN Youth Australia is committed to acting with urgency and purpose to support the community of young people across the nation during COVID-19 by making information, resources and support accessible. This support will bring confidence to young people across Australia and allow them to play a role in helping the nation recover from COVID-19.

EVATT NATIONAL FINALS

UN Youth's National Evatt Competition is Australia's largest debating and diplomacy competition. The Evatt Competition gives students hands-on insight into the operation of the most powerful international organisation in the history of the interstate system and exposure to some of the most important questions facing the international community. Throughout 2019, Evatt Competition rounds were held across the country in every Division of UN Youth. Almost 2000 students participated, tackling some of the most pressing issues of our times. Evatt National Finals were held in Brisbane from 25th November to 1st December 2019. The winners were Liv and Yannee from Victoria.



INTERNATIONAL ACTIVITIES

MIDDLE EAST EXPERIENCE

Internationally, UN Youth Australia coordinates a variety of educational tours designed to foster ideas and innovation giving young people the inspiration and support they need to create change. In January 2020 UN Youth took 16 inquisitive students to the Middle East to explore themes of nationalism, religion and statehood in Israel and Jordan. The experience is designed to provide students with both the access to learn a huge amount from people living in this region of the world, whilst also enabling them to ask difficult questions and formulate their own opinions on some of the biggest political crises in both modern and historical times.



YOUNG DIPLOMATS TOUR

In January 2022, UN Youth will take 16 young leaders from around Australia on a four-week tour of Europe to explore the complex realities of diplomacy in the 21st Century. Over four weeks and seven countries, delegates meet and engage with the key players in international diplomacy - from UN representatives, European politicians, diplomats, embassies, leading thinkers, to NGOs and grassroots organisations whilst exploring breathtaking historical sites across Europe.



AMERICAN POLITICAL TOUR

In January 2020, UN Youth took 16 young leaders from across Australia on a four-week tour of the United States of America to explore the current state of American politics. Delegates unpacked the intricacies of American politics through briefly looking into history and exploring the places, people, and forces that have shaped America as we know it. In each state, delegates visited monuments, museums, and memorials to better understand how notable events in American history have led us to where we are now.

VOICE NATIONAL FINALS

Voice is a public speaking and problem solving competition, where students in years 7-10 are given a problem, and tasked with solving it. They then present that solution in a short pitch to the judges. Rounds are held in most states and territories, with the winners advancing to the national finals. Voice National Finals took place on the 15th and 16th of April 2020, and became UN Youth Australia's first fully online event. The winners were Tara (Junior Division) and Siena (Senior Division), both from Queensland.



YOUTH REPRESENTATIVE

In February, Australia's youth representative to the United Nations, Kareem El-Ansary, released the 2019 UN Youth Report detailing consultation with 7,000 young people across the country, asking: What will our future look like if young people are heard today? The foremost priority for young people engaged by Kareem's Listening Tour was the issue of education and its relevance to the lives of young people today, not only in its capacity to skill and prepare young people to find meaningful employment in a changing economy, but also to navigate the increasing complexity of 21st century living. UN Youth Australia announced that Lucy Stronach is the Australian Youth Representative to the United Nations for 2021. The Youth Representative program is run by UN Youth Australia in partnership with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. Lucy will be consulting with young people in every State and Territory across Australia gathering data on what issues young people care most about. During the Listening Tour, Lucy will be asking young Australians 'What would Australia look like if young people were the key drivers of decision making?' In 2021, Lucy will take these ideas to the United Nations where she will advocate on behalf of Australia's young Australians to have their voices heard.

2020 continues to be a year like no other. The combination of health, economic, environmental and social factors continues to provide personal and professional challenges for us all – including when it comes to forecasting the major outcomes under many, if not all of the programs and projects of the United Nations.

In response to the Covid-19 crisis, WFUNA issued the following statement on 23 April 2020:

The World Federation of United Nations Associations (WFUNA) convened a meeting of our global civil society organization to gather country information from the over 100 national members shared promising practices and lessons learned in this global COVID-19 health pandemic. The Members, therefore, issued a CALL:

For countries to reinvest in the United Nations at a time when national borders are closing more tightly: For a post-COVID-19 world where the UN is at the centre building a "new normal" of reduced inequities - in access to resources, medical care, decent housing and care - in short, where the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) inform each country's renewal plans:

For additional focus on the economic and social support to the most vulnerable (women, children, people with disabilities, etc.) and the most vulnerable territories during and post pandemic interventions;

For global investments in climate financing and de-nuclearization - two other existential threats; and For UN Peacebuilding to integrate the securitisation of global health and the risks of future global health pandemics into decision frameworks.

The Members of WFUNA RECOGNIZE countries which have invested through the World Health Organization (WHO) and other UN bodies at a time many are looking inward, and acknowledge the responsibilities of highly developed countries to invest in the least developed countries, including through social infrastructure (like UNAs) and physical infrastructure to liberate full participation in global prosperity.

Although the adjustment to COVID-19 has been a challenge, WFUNA remains strong in its mission to support the goals of the United Nations, and make the world a better place. As part of the UN75 celebrations, WFUNA issued the following Proclamation on the principle theme of "2020 and Beyond: Shaping Our Future Together":

During January and February 2020, I spent 3 weeks in New York City and took part in the following WFUNA programs and events focusing on the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Sustainable Development Goals.





On 3 February 2020, I took part in the Civil Society Dialogue with the President of the United Nations Security Council for the month of February, the Permanent Representative of Belgium H.E. Mr Marc Pecsteen de Buytswerve held at the UNHQ. I had the opportunity to ask the President about the safety of the UN Briefers and what is being done to protect such briefers in undertaking their work. This event was web-cast by UNTV.



I was invited to present the work of WFUNA to about 75 youth from Jamaica taking part in the 2020 WIMUN held in New York's Grand Hyatt Hotel on 1 February.



On 4 February 2020, I took part in the outgoing UN Security Council Members Exit Interviews held in the EcoSoc Council Chambers at the UN HQ. Five outgoing non-permanent members of the Security Council gave their experiences whilst they were members of the council, and what lessons we could learn from their experiences. I had the opportunity to put a question to each of the five members. This event was web-cast on UNTV.



I took part in the WFUNA Regional UNA Meeting - Asia-Pacific on Friday 3 July 2020 (together with Mario D'Elia and Lachlan Hunter.



I was on the panel of organisers and special guests to inaugurate the 2020 WFUNA's International Model United Nations (WIMUN) in New York. This year, WIMUN had in excess of 800 students taking part from more than 35 countries. It was one of the most successful events held under WIMUN.



I visited our WFUNA secretariat offices in New York and witness the great work the staff and volunteers are doing to promote the work of the United Nations. I had numerous meetings with our senior staff and the Sec-Gen of WFUNA.

In May 2020, WFUNA hosted two virtual United Nations Security Council Elections Debates with candidates from regional groups competing for non-permanent seats for the 2021-2022 term. The African Group Debate was held on May 27, and featured candidates from Djibouti and Kenya. The candidate countries were represented by the Permanent Representatives of both Missions to the UN, H.E. Mr. Mohamed Siad Doualeh of Djibouti and H.E. Mr. Lazarus Ombai Amayo of Kenya.

The Western European and Others Group Debate was held on May 29th and featured candidates from Canada, Ireland, and Norway. The candidate countries were represented by the Permanent Representatives of all three Missions to the UN, H.E. Mr. Marc-André Blanchard of Canada, H.E. Ms. Geraldine Byrne Nason of Ireland, and H.E. Ms. Mona Juul of Norway.

2020 has turned out to be a challenging year, however WFUNA is working hard for alternative measures to ensure continuity in its goal of trust and transparency in government and institutions. It is shifting many of its programs to virtual meetings and webinars, ensuring everyone's ability to attend and participate. These debates are growing with some 800 participants for the two debates, including some 150 member states despite the fact that it was held online for the first time.

HON. DR. LYNN ARNOLD AO THE SDGS

Dr. Lynn Arnold AO is former Premier of South Australia and former CEO of World Vision Australia. Prior to his appointment as Premier in 1992, Dr. Arnold worked in Labor government for 11 years. He has extensive experience working with World Vision, having also served as Senior Director for World Vision International and World Vision's Regional Vice-President for Asia and the Pacific. A long time member of the UNAA SA, Dr. Arnold has held the positions of State President in South Australia and National Vice-President. Dr. Arnold is also former CEO of Anglicare SA, which works in the areas of aged care, families, vulnerable people, housing and economic participation. He was awarded the Order of Australia in 2004 for his services to Australia through the South Australian Parliament and internationally through development and humanitarian aid assistance. In 2013, he was ordained Deacon in the Anglican Church and since 2014 has been serving as a Priest in Adelaide.



ERIKA FELLER REFUGEES AND ASYLUM SEEKERS

From 2005 to 2013, Ms. Feller held the post of Assistant High Commissioner (Protection), one of the four top management positions of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, carrying the United Nations grade of Assistant Secretary-General. Her professional career has included 14 years and three international postings with the Australian diplomatic service, followed by 26 years with UNHCR, both in Geneva and the field. As the High Commissioner's Representative in Malaysia, Singapore and Brunei, she concurrently served as UNHCR's Regional Coordinator for Status Determination for the Indo-Chinese refugee outflow. Ms. Feller was also Director of the Department of International Protection. She is currently serving as a Professorial Fellow with the University of Melbourne's School of Government. Her recent work is on regional refugee protection and the reduction of statelessness.





GRACE FORREST **ANTI-SLAVERY**

Grace is a Founding Director of the Walk Free Foundation, an international human rights group with an objective to end modern slavery. Underpinned by research, the Walk Free Foundation uses direct engagement with business, government, faiths, and grassroots intervention to drive systems to change from the top down and ground up. Grace has spent extensive time working in South East Asia and the Middle East, using photography and storytelling to share the stories of survivors of modern slavery, with a current focus on refugee communities. She is also a Director of the Minderoo Foundation, recently joined the Board of the Centre for Humanitarian Dialogue and previously worked at the Legatum Institute as a research analyst on global people movement.



TANYA HOSCH **RIGHTS OF INDIGENOUS PEOPLES**

Tanya Hosch is the General Manager of Inclusion and Social Policy at the AFL, making her the first ever Indigenous person and 2nd woman in the AFL's Executive. Ms Hosch has a long and distinguished history in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander policy, advocacy, governance and fundraising. At the AFL Tanya's portfolios include - Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander issues, Gender equality, Sexuality and Gender Diversity. Tanya is tasked with the implementation of the AFL's enhanced Indigenous strategy, advising the AFL Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Advisory Council, maintenance of the Respect and Responsibility Policy, 2017, the AFL's Gender Action Plan and the Gender Diversity Policy. Tanya is the 2021 South Australian Australian of the Year.
