WFUNA is a global not-for-profit which coordinates the work of national United Nations Associations in over 100 countries.

The UNAA consists of hundreds of volunteers, many more members and thousands of supporters across Australia. Our teams throughout Australia mobilise these networks to organise events and activities in support of the UN and Australia's role as a member state.

OUR PATRONS

PUBLIC POLICY COMMITTEE

Director Andrew Hewett is the inaugural chair of our Public Policy Committee established in early 2021. In its first full year of operations the Committee finalised two policy statements, initiated work on a number of others, provided advice to the national board on advocacy approaches and engaged members to promote the Sustainable Development Goals to candidates standing for election to Federal Parliament.

Our statement on Australia's relationship with the United Nations follows the research paper prepared by Senuri Perera in 2020 on the 'UN's importance to Australia and the World in an era of COVID-19.'

THE STATEMENT URGES ALL AUSTRALIAN POLITICAL PARTIES TO:



Engage Australian young people with more UN initiatives and streamline programs for Australians to enter the UN family

Practically implement gender obligations and the Women, Peace and Security agenda



Undertake a greater leadership role on the international stage, supporting multilateral institutions and processes, facilitating collaborations, and sharing science in the pursuit of a safer, fairer, and more sustainable world



Better communicate the benefits Australia stands to gain from increasing UN engagement.

Our research shows that Australia has played an important leadership role within the United Nations including during its foundation.

Australia has engaged more with the UN where Australia's

- International interests were prioritized more than bilateral alliances.
- National interests were defined broadly
- Domestic politics supported or were not hostile to furthered engagement with the UN
- Federal Government adopted a more internationalist policy outlook.

lintegrate Sustainable Development Goals and targets within domestic and foreign policy and reporting frameworks.



Strengthen transparency, collaboration and communication on the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals across all foreign and development policy.



Fund a secretariat to coordinate national action on the Sustainable Development Goals and develop a national public awareness campaign to increase understanding, engagement, commitment and partnerships to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals.

Across April and May the UNAA focused attention on the Sustainable Development Goals. We supported our members to promote the goals as a Blueprint for domestic and international policy. We highlighted the SDGs in our social media channels, built a toolkit with a webinar for members, and profiled the leading research of Professor Robert Hales of Griffith University. See the opinion piece prepared by Chair of our Public Policy Committee Andrew Hewett here and a detailed analysis of party policies in our webinar. We are continuing to promote the goals and provide information and support to elected members and senators. Our evaluation of this first year of work will inform recommendations on advocacy strategy for the next three years.

PROMOTING OUR COMMON AGENDA.

Our Common Agenda is the UN Secretary General's report prepared following consultations during the 75th Anniversary. It looks ahead to the next 25 years and presents his vision on the future of global cooperation and reinvigorating inclusive, networked, and effective multilateralism. The Secretary-General tasked a High-Level Advisory Board with reflecting the substantive research into effective multilateralism and global public goods and will developing independent, concrete recommendations for the Secretary-General and Member States. These will be considered at the 2024 Summit of the Future timed to coincide with the General Assembly's high level week in September.

We are working with members, partners and stakeholders to prepare a program of activity to raise awareness of this initiative.



FEDERAL PARLIAMENT

The National President followed up our successful UN & Australia Partnerships Forum held in April 2021 with correspondence to all Members and Senators in the Australian Parliament in July 2021. He shared the Forum Communique and Report and subsequently met with policy staff in the offices of Zed Seselja, Minister for International Development and the Pacific, Senator Christina Keneally and Senator Penny Wong and directly with Zali Stegall MP for Warringah, Senator Janet Rice, Greens spokesperson for Foreign Affairs and Senator Mehreen Farugi to explore the value of the Sustainable Development Goals as a blueprint for recovery internationally and in Australia.

Directors Brian Gleeson and Claire Moore are working together to support the recovening of the Friends of the UN Parliamentary Group in the 47th Parliament. We will continue to provide information and support to Members and Senators in their areas of policy focus with support from our Alumni and Academic Networks and Members.



CLIMATE CHANGE COLLABORATION NETWORK

Our Climate Change Collaboration Program is defining three projects that will enable companies, communities and governments to work together to achieve our net zero targets, and is contributing to an update of our Climate Change Position Statement.

CLIMATE READY AUSTRALIA 2030

The Climate Change Collaboration Network recommended UNAA join Climate Ready Australia 2030 as a foundation member.

<u>Climate Ready Australia</u> is social impact initiative of Griffith University is working with society to shape a climate ready future, low carbon and climate resilient. The initiative is engaging peak bodies across Australian business and civil society to set an agenda, empower partnerships, progress transformative actions and champion the capability we need to secure a prosperous and just future. Agenda setting workshops will run in the second half of 2022.

Leaders on the CRI Board include Chair Rosemary Addis AM, John Hewson AM, Professor Brendan Mackey, Ann Sherry AO, Sophia Hamblin Wang, Tony Mcavoy SC, and Sam Mackay.

ALUMNI NETWORK

Director Brian Gleeson is convening the UN Alumni Network. Alumni are based across the globe and across Australia. The network now has a regular newsletter and a social channel for network communications. Network members expressed their interest in a range of roles – mentor, resource person, speaker or team member on specific assignments. Links are being forged with our member organisations and other networks so that we can engage with, learn from and celebrate the work of Australians in the UN system and inspire other Australians to contribute.

NATIONAL FORUM

The National Forum Steering Group and Working Party began building the business case for our next National Forum which we hope to hold in person in 2023.



DIVISION ACTIVITY HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY



UNAA strives to inform, inspire and engage all Australians about the critical work, goals, and values of the United Nations to create a safer, fairer and more sustainable world. The ACT Division marked UN Day (25 October, 2021) by engaging with Mr Gary Quinlan, the Australian Ambassador and Permanent Representative to the United Nations in New York from 2009 until January 2015, and Australian Representative on the United Nations Security Council 2013-2014. He drew from his extensive career in the UN to share reflections on the role of UN multilateralism in the contemporary world. One where relations between states have changed so decisively and where the world order established after WW2 is under fundamental challenge. His challenge to us was to together keep exploring the role of the UN, its reform and the importance of Australia's position in fostering its objectives.



ORANGE THE WORLD: END VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN NOW!

On 25th November 2021, Honorary Associate Professor Sally Moyle spoke with the UNAA ACT Division and our event attendees on the need to build more positive relations of power if we are to eliminate violence, and the role of intersectional gender equality in that endeavour. Sally was the Chief Executive Officer at CARE Australia and had also been the Principal Gender Specialist and Assistant Secretary with the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. She related to the participants that all of the great global challenges we face are built on systems of dominance human power over the environment leading to global heating; geopolitical 'might is right' delivering armed conflict and endemic poverty; systems of corruption and inequality marginalising whole communities and entrenching privilege. The antidote to these systems of dominance lies in addressing the SDGs starting from intersectional gender equality and seriously addressing violence against women.







50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE UN CONFERENCE ON THE **ENVIRONMENT**

On 28th June, 2022, our distinguished speaker Mr Jamie Isbister, Australia's Ambassador for the Environment, discussed the key messages that commemorated the International Day on Environment and the outcomes of this Stockholm Conference. Mr Isbister spoke broadly on climate and environmental issues and drew on important work being done in the Indo-Pacific. Together we explored the theme of the conference: "Stockholm +50: a healthy planet for the prosperity of all – our responsibility, our opportunity".

NEW SOUTH WALES



UNAA NSW RECONNECTION PICNIC

On 10th April 2022,150 people attended the UNAA NSW Reconnection Picnic which contributed to SDG 3: Good Health and Wellbeing.

The event helped people in the Sydney CBD to reconnect in-person following the lock- downs, particularly people who are more vulnerable to misinformation about Covid, and less able to access reliable information, including younger people and older people.

Reverend Bill Crews from the Exodus Foundation highlighted the importance of social cohesion and called on us and governments to do more for people who experience greater impacts on their health and wellbeing due to Covid because of their vulnerability.

Associate Professor Holly Seale, University of Sydney provided us with current NSW Health information about how we and our communities can stay safe.

Dr Sonu Bhasker gave us practical advice about staying healthy and inspired us with his message about what we can achieve when we work collaboratively, "Together, we can!" Special thank you to our partners Multicultural NSW for the grant funding, and the City of Sydney Council for the amazing venue at Martin Place.







VOLVO OCEAN LOVERS FESTIVAL

On 22-24 April 2022 the UNAA NSW were proud partners of the Volvo Ocean Lovers Festival, an all-ages and all-weekend event that was enjoyed by thousands of people at Sydney's iconic Bondi Beach! The wide range of activities included amazing student artworks inside the Bondi Surf Club, Ocean Lab Workshops and interactive displays, Market Stalls, and a full stage program of Live Music and fascinating talks on stage in Bondi Park, all in support of SDG 14: Life Below Water. The Big Bondi Beach Clean had around 100 enthusiastic participants and we collected 4,128 pieces of rubbish in just an hour! The UNAA NSW were invited to coordinate the volunteers for the festival. We hosted six online Meetups with ocean experts as guest speakers to create strong engagement with volunteers leading up to the festival. We had 30 volunteers attend the festival, and 118 people attended one or more of the Meetups.



PARTNERSHIP WITH WESTERN SYDNEY UNIVERSITY

On 31st March 2022, the UNAA NSW proudly launched a new partnership with Western Sydney University (WSU). Professor Simon Barry, Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Vice-President (Academic) showcased the incredible achievement of Western Sydney University being named number one in the world for its social, ecological and economic impact in the Times Higher Education (THE) University Impact Rankings.

The University placed 1st overall worldwide and 1st in Australia in the prestigious annual rankings, which assess universities on their commitment to the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals. The rankings are based on universities' teaching, research, outreach and stewardship.

The partnership is supported by an MOU that includes hosting monthly Meetups in-person at WSU campuses, providing WSU students with real-life UNAA NSW projects for their placements, and exploring further partnerships and opportunities to promote the Sustainable Development Goals.





On 24th October, to mark the 76th Anniversary of the United Nations the UNAA NT arranged to have the United Nations Flag flying high at Government House, Parliament House and Arafura Stadium. Our sincere appreciation to Her Honour the Honourable Vicki O'Halloran AO, Administrator of the Northern Territory and the then Speaker of the Legislative Assembly Minister Ngaree Ah Kit.

As Patron of the UNAA NT Her Honour the Honourable Vicki O'Halloran AO, Administrator of the Northern Territory hosted a reception at Government House in November in recognition of the 76th Anniversary of the United Nations.

It was a wonderful evening providing UNAA NT members, community leaders and the diplomatic corps in the NT with the opportunity to hear from and meet with Her Honour and Mr O'Hallorhan.

Our President Ms Kate Heelan gave an inspiring speech about the work of the association, the Sustainable Development Goals and future initiatives and activities for the association. What an incredible afternoon for the UNAA NT on Human Rights Day on 10th December, with special thanks to Mr Mark Thomas, Barrister and Human Rights Advocate who gave an inspirational and informative speech. Mr Thomas spoke about his past involvement in several legal cases that raised real issues around Human Rights. These matters are very close to home as they are local cases here in the Territory.

Mr Thomas spoke of his journey through the legal fraternity and his first employment as a defence lawyer for a period of 8 years at the first Aboriginal Legal Service in Australia, in Redfern in Sydney. Mr Thomas has also acted for asylum seekers in Federal Court and has also sat on the board of the Melaleuca Refugee Centre in the Northern Territory.

Mark's speech highlighted the importance of SDG 16, Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions, and SGD 10 Reduced Inequalities, in celebrating the human rights movement around the world. "Article 1 of the Declaration of Human Rights proclaims that human rights is a fundamental part of being alive, of being human.

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY WALK

On 5th March, the UNAA NT Division, together with the City of Darwin, Northern Territory Government, Office of Gender Equity and Diversity, Speaker of the Legislative Assembly hosted the International Women's Day walk celebrating the outstanding achievements of local women and creating a more collaborative, inclusive, and connected community. Approximately 600-700 participants participated in the walk on Saturday 6th March 2022.

Following a Welcome to country smoking ceremony, the walk commenced at 9am through the CBD led by the Administrator of the Northern Territory Her Honour Vicki O'Halloran and the Darwin City Brass Band. The walk concluded at Parliament House where the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly hosted an incredible morning tea. During the morning tea we heard from two amazing territory women, the then Speaker of the Legislative Assembly Hon Ngaree Ah Kit and Ms Sally Gearin on their career journeys. A powerful reminder of SDG 5 Gender Equality.

Attendees included the Her Honour, The Chief Minister, Ministers, Member for Solomon Mr Luke Gosling and MLAs, Lord Mayor of Darwin, Diplomatic Corps, Community Leaders and members of the Public. THE DR DOUG EVERINGHAM LECTURE

Dr Everingham was a medical doctor who represented the region of Capricornia in Federal Parliament and was Minister For Health in the Whitlam Government. He represented Australia at UN Peace and Security and World Health conferences, and was committed to the Human rights principles. His family gifted UNAA QLD and the State Library his memorabilia, and the lecture was a central event.

The 2021 guest speaker was Leanne Smith, international human rights lawyer with experience in the Human Rights Commission, and now the Chief Executive of the Commission, as an Australian diplomat and in a range of positions in the United Nations, most recently as Chief of Policy and Best Practices for UN Peacekeeping Operations.

This year's lecture was by videoconference, and over 80 people heard Leanne's presentation on Peace, Dignity and Equality on a Healthy Planet; How Australia can contribute to the UN Common Agenda.







The May 2022 Peacekeepers event in May saw the return of the march from City Hall to Anzac Square after Covid restrictions. This event commemorates the critical role of UN Peacekeepers across war ravaged areas around the world. The Governor of QLD, Jeanette Youngaddressed over 80 people, including representatives from the military, churches, local government and Honorary Consuls from several nations, as she reinforced the importance of the peacekeepers 'work and sacrifice, as well as the ongoing work of the United Nations . Kristy Miles described her experiences as a peacekeeper, and a parent, reinforcing the need for peace.





INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PEACE 21 SEPTEMBER


Our Peace and Security Team coordinates celebration of this day with community partners at St Johns Cathedral .In. in 2021, this included a special event with two UNAA QLD members, Teresa and Augnes Joy, achieving a world record for singing the national anthems of 195 countries over several hours. The sisters 'programme, Salute the Nations is focussed on the need for peace among nations, and received wide publicity locally and internationally.

The International Day of Peace (IDP) lecture was by retired General Chris Barrie, whose theme was the two major threats to the world, nuclear war and climate disaster, demanding the engagement of young people in working for real peace and international cooperation.

Our partners, the Rotary Peace Centre at University of Queensland presented the local Agents of Peace Awards at the event. Annette Brownlie, Vice President of UNAA QLD, received an award, as well as Maggie Pretorias.

This year we shared with Pureland Learning Centre in Toowoomba in a local commemoration of International Day of Peace . We have established a partnership with Pureland in this regional city based on our shared commitment to developing community engagement and understanding of peace. A further partnership has been made with Heartfulness, an international relaxation and meditation organisation with the hope of cooperation in promoting peace and building community links with the UN.

UNAA QLD partnered with local Soroptimists in an IDP event at Windaroo Peace Park. Past President Donnelle Davis, a long term Soroptimist presented to a group, including local councillors from two regional councils and community representatives around the UN Secretary General's message and the importance of the SDG Agenda. UNAA QLD presented a sculpture by George Virine to the local council for public display





Again at St Johns Cathedral, with the great support from Dean Peter Catt, we celebrated Human Rights Day on 10th Dewituation for women and the horrors of family separation. Over \$1400 was raised for Mahboba's Promise, an Australian NGO supporting women and families in Afghanistan.

At this event Life Membership of UNAA QLD was presented to former President, Clem Campbell, whose commitment to Earth Charter and engagement with schools to promote the UN is a real inspiration.



UNAA QLD has a series of annual events, focussing on the SDG Agenda, and featuring our ongoing commitment to the importance of peace in our community and our world. Our SDG Champions Awards celebrate people in our community who have demonstrated personal commitment to the sustainable development goal agenda. The 17 Goals are grouped under 5 categories People Goals 1-5; Planet Goals 6,12,13,14,15; Prosperity Goals 7-11; Peace and Justice Goal 16, and Partnerships Goal 17.

Nominations reflect personal activity and contributions in the local community. The 2021 Champions inspire and reinforce the values of the SDGs.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA



THE UN DECADE OF RESTORATION AND CLIMATE CHANGE

The UNAA SA was pleased to participate and sponsor the OzFISH Seeds for Snapper Forum at the Cruising Yacht Club South Australia on Saturday the 4th of December 2021. It was a picturesque setting where attendees enjoyed a hearty barbeque before hearing about all the good work being performed by OzFish to regenerate seagrass, which is so vital to the promotion of marine life.

Associate Professor Jason Tanner, Seagrass Program Manager at SARDI informed the Forum about the research SARDI have been performing along the Adelaide coastline in respect to seagrass restoration. It was fascinating to learn about how we can all contribute to the program through collecting seeds that wash up on our beaches and then delivering them to OzFish where they are able to be kept alive in large tanks. We then heard from Tony Flaherty, Manager of Coasts and Marine, Green Adelaide Landscape Board about how they support the work being done to restore our coastlines. Dr Warwick Noble, Senior Scientific Officer at the EPA, informed us that the regeneration of seagrass along our coastline will benefit the community for future generations to come. Especially with respect to reducing erosion, which if left unchecked, would cause major issues for infrastructure like underwater pipes.

Finally we heard from Dr Michael Sierp, OzFish Managing Director, who discussed using waste like hessian coffee bags to provide a base to enable the seagrass to become established. Once the seagrass is established in those bags, the bags are then placed in the ocean. This method gives the seagrass the best chance of survival. Through using by-products like these bags, OzFish are creating a "360 system" to restore seagrass.

Lidia Moretti.UNAA SA President spoke about the value of this work in relation to Climate Change and the UN's Sustainable Development Goals. Several attendees have shown interest in collaborating with our Division with other projects for the UN Decade of Restoration and Climate Change.

We look forward to continuing to promote OzFish's work in Seagrass restoration and to be involved in OzFish's future projects, like cleaning up the ocean.

The event was a reminder of the extraordinary talent that is now assembled in Adelaide connected with the space industry. The Australian Space Agency is an independent central entity aiming to unify and advance space related science, services exploration and travel. SDGS GUIDE FOR AUSTRALIAN ORGANISATIONS

In late 2021, UNAA Victoria partnered with Spark Strategy to produce 'The UN Sustainable Development Goals = social, environmental, and business value: an Australian handbook with insights, advice, and practical strategies'.

More than 350 people registered to attend the November launch of the handbook, which included speakers whose organisations were featured as case studies in the handbook such as the Sydney Opera House, Zoos Victoria, Transurban, the Lord Mayor's Charitable Foundation and Western Sydney University.

The handbook provides information and advice for private and community sector, government and academic organisations, including:

- Organisations unfamiliar with the SDGs and unsure where to start
- Companies which have been aligning to the SDGs but looking to learn more, do things
- differently and tap into the experiences and insights of others
- SDG leaders who are committed to the Goals and leading the way in how Australian
- organisations implement them.

The guide provides key background information about the SDGs in the Australian context, the benefits of utilising them, and case studies and practical guidance.

From October to March, UNAAV staff worked with two groups of students from Indian universities taking part in internships as part of the Industry – University partnerships for the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Four students from Lal Bahadur Shastri Institute of Management, Delhi, researched Nature Based and Human Solutions for Tackling Biodiversity Loss (SDGs 14, 15 and 17), while students from the Centre for Social Sensitivity and Action, Goa Institute of Management, researched A World without Waste: Making the transition to a Circular Economy (SDG 12 and 17).

Students researched their topic from the perspective of an allocated UN Member State and then verbally presented the views of their country in an online, mini-Model UN moderated by UNAA Victoria President Professor Ian Howie as Secretary-General. Goa Institute of Management, Director, Ajit Parulekar congratulated all participants for the presentations as well as the discussion. "This is an excellent initiative that introduces participants to geo-politics, especially those related to climate change". Participant Seya Sarah Geejo said it was a "privilege to represent Australia and to propose the amendments along with my fellow member nations. Circularity and international partnership are truly the only way forward for a sustainable future that leaves no one behind, as rightly stated in the vision for UN SDG goals of Agenda 2030".

UNAA Victoria continued to deliver Model UNs - simulations of the UN General Assembly - online and face to face as schools began to return to more normal operations post the global pandemic. A UNAA Victoria Model UN is a highly interactive full-day simulation of the UN General Assembly during which delegates step into the shoes of UN ambassadors from countries around the world and discuss contentious global issues – with the aim being to find the best possible solution through dialogue, negotiation and multilateral diplomacy. Each Model UN debates a topic related to the UN's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and delegates develop a "new" UN resolution addressing the issue. Topics include Asylum Seekers and Refugees: A Global Humanitarian Crisis; Combating Climate Change: Committing to Global Action and Planet Ocean: Protecting the World's Oceans, Seas and Marine Resources. In addition to Model UNs hosted by schools, UNAA Victoria partners with the Victorian Government to deliver Model UNs in other languages (Japanese, Italian, French, German and Indonesian) and to schools in rural and regional settings.





On the 24th of October 2021, UNAA WA celebrated their 76th anniversary at the Boola Bardip, WA Museum of Culture, Perth. The evening also celebrated the winners and finalists of annual UN Day awards.

Over 250 distinguished guests attended with the highest number of guests turnout in the history of UNAA WA. Leaders of WA's business, cultural communities, public and education sectors, and volunteers from at least 50 cultural backgrounds attended the celebration. Consuls General representing Germany, Greece, Indonesia, Italy, India, Malaysia, USA, and Vietnam were there to give their warm support. State Director of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT), Former Minister of Environment and Heritage, Members of Parliament and former UN Staffs also attended to demonstrate solidarity in the support for multilateralism and global cooperation.

President of UNAA WA, Dr Sandy Chong, gave opening remarks for the evening where she congratulated the United Nations (UN) across the world for successfully entering its 76th year, emphasising the need to progress human rights, gender equality, environment and social impact. A virtual address given by Guy Ryder, Director-General of the International Labour Organisation (ILO) from Geneva highlighted the continuing quest for a kinder and generous world to eradicate hunger, inequality and safety for the young. He concluded by thanking the UNAA WA for their continuing support and active participation.

Keynote addresses were delivered from Sandy Anghie, Deputy Lord Mayor for City of Perth and Parris Laurie, West Coast Eagles AFLW Best Club Person 2021. They've highlighted the importance of diversity, multiculturalism, community collaboration and support to reduce inequality, building a better world for all by 2030.

The formal proceedings ended with sumptuous canapes and engaging exchange between guests and dignitaries about the importance of international peace, multiculturalism, and community solidarity for a strong recovery ahead. We look forward to celebrating this significant milestone in 2022.







UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF **HUMAN RIGHTS DAY**

On 10th December 2021, The UNAA WA Human Rights Committee organised an event to commemorate the UN Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The theme of this event was "The Importance of Non-Violence." The event was hosted by Borderless Gandhi, which works to spread the principles of Mahatma Gandhi, including non-violence. The panel tackled questions relating to how non-violence, safety and peace allows for the recovery process for persons traumatised by violence, such as refugees, war zone survivors, domestic violence victims. The speakers shared their experiences in assisting survivors with the recovery process, assistance available for those seeking asylum and refuge in Australia, and how the granting of certain visas could help the survivors in their mental recovery.





On Australia Day this year, UNAA WA President Dr. Sandy Chong who serves as an Ambassador of Auspire for the Australia Day Council, supported the Community Citizen Awards ceremony at the City of Canning. She reflected on what Australia Day means to her - a day to reflect on, respect, and celebrate the ways in which we have shaped Australia's society, of the efforts of both Aboriginal custodians and migrants to Australia since the 18th century. She urged that we commemorate those who made sacrifices to live in Australia and to protect the opportunities that we enjoy here. In ending her message of solidarity, Dr. Chong emphasised that, despite our differences, we are shaped by our country just as we shape it, and that we continue to do our best in ensuring that we keep it united, beautiful, and free.





On Wednesday 4 May 2022, the UNAA WA, in partnership with the WA Museum Boola Bardip, held an awards ceremony to celebrate student artwork on human rights submitted for the Yolande Frank Art Awards 2021. The event was attended by more than 60 staff, students, families, members of the jury, sponsors, and friends from Ukraine. All artworks will be displayed in the foyer at the Museum throughout the month of May 2022 until mid-June.






UNAA WA SDG FORUM SERIES: "NEVER WASTE A CRISIS: REBIRTH OF THE SUSTAINABILITY AGENDA"

The UNAA WA held a panel discussion at Ernst & Young (EY) on the 2nd of June 2022. "Never Waste a Crisis: Rebirth of the Sustainability Agenda" addressed the current world crisis and invited the panellists to share important measures that could help people and communities affected by it. Speakers include Geoff Baker, a member of the Western Australian Legislative Assembly for South Perth, Tim Shanahan, Future Battery Industries Cooperative Research Centre, Fiona Argyle, Mayor of the City of Nedlands, and Adam Carrel, a partner at EY.

The panellists urged businesses to make a change by adapting effective and sustainable practices. Nations need to move in the right direction and continued regulations surrounding pollution and greenwashing will go far in the promotion and development of the SDGs. The event was well-attended by 90 guests including UNAA WA members and community partners, and it concluded with light snacks and drinks.

The United Nations Association of Australia Young Professionals (UNAA YP) are a national network of motivated individuals, working together to inform, inspire and engage early to midcareer Australians.

We host online and in-person events, networking, and issues advocacy to ensure young Australians remain engaged in the work and values of the United Nations throughout their careers. The UNAA YP network consists of a national executive and state teams in NSW, WA, ACT, VIC, and QLD.

NATIONAL EXECUTIVE

Across 2021, UNAA Young Professionals delivered 'Sustainability in Action', an online and free event series celebrating the United Nations International Year of Creative Economy for Sustainable Development. Online events were hosted by state teams in conjunction with national support and covered a wide array of themes in sustainability, from protecting the Great Barrier Reef to ethical clothing.

In 2022 the UNAA YPs began delivery of their national online event series, 'My Climate Action'. My Climate Action is providing young professionals with ideas, actionable resources, and inspiration to get involved in local work and directly contribute towards climate change mitigation.

On Wednesday 27th April, we launched the series with event one: 'Ecosystem Restoration' speaking to Jimi Gatland and Jessica Pinder about practical actions we can all take in our homes, communities, and wider environment, 'getting our hands dirty' to create positive climate action. Further events on mental health, personal consumption, and climate action focused careers will be delivered later in 2022 and reported on in the following annual report.



UNAA VICTORIA YOUNG PROFESSIONALS

On Wednesday the 29th of June, the Victorian YP team hosted over 60 participants in their International Careers Mentoring Event. The event hosted mentors representing the United National High Commissioner for Refugees, the United Nations Populations Fund, the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Oaktree, and PwC Australia.

Participants were given opportunities to network and rotate conversations with individual mentors. Mentors were on hand to provide advice and ideas about international careers in the UN and related international organisations, the private sector and not-for-profits, as well as Government. This night was a success with our panel of mentors providing great insights into different career pathways in international affairs.

UNAA YOUNG PROFESSIONALS QUEENSLAND

In 2021-22 the Queensland team designed and hosted a series of events that brought together young professionals from many disciplines to engage in important, action-focused conversations around the SDGs:

Queensland continues its Yoga for Peace series, raising funds to support the Romero Centre's refugee support work. We also held informal networking nights to keep connected with our members and friends.

We collaborated with the UNAA QLD Division for events including Human Rights Day Commemoration in December 2021 and helped deliver the outstanding UN Habitat III + 5 series of six roundtable webinars Feb-July 2022.

UN YOUTH

UN Youth Australia is a national youth-run organisation affiliated with the UNAA that aims to educate and empower young people on global issues. During the pandemic, it has largely pivoted to running online and hybrid events to ensure that delegates can get as much value as possible out of its events while also staying safe.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE

National Conference is UN Youth Australia's longest running initiative and has been bringing together students from every state and territory since 1963. In 2022, it ran using a hybrid model which allowed students to gather in-person with delegates from their home states while completing a combination of physical and virtual activities. The conference focused on the theme of Rethinking Law and Justice and therefore had a particular focus on SDG 16. The Honourable Michael Kirby delivered the keynote address, and delegates were heard from a range of other legal experts including Trent Wallace, Zoe Robinson, Bernie Shakeshaft, Paul Hayes, Elizabeth Kelso, Estella Pearce and Allen George.

FVATT NATIONAL FINALS

UN Youth's National Evatt Competition is Australia's largest Model United Nations Competition. Students across Australia are invited to consider a wide range of issues related to international security and development while learning about the functions of the Security Council. The competition is run by every division of UN Youth Australia and in 2021 well over 1000 students participated across the country. The Evatt competition has a particular focus on regional engagement and is run in many regional centres as well as in capital cities. The top teams from each state are invited to compete in the Evatt National Finals, which were held online in 2021 due to border closures.

VOICE NATIONAL FINALS

Hundreds of students from year 7-10 compete in the Voice competition. They are asked to develop and pitch solutions to pressing global issues, many of which are linked to the Sustainable Development Goals. For example, some of the questions students were asked to consider in 2021 included "how can we ensure that the benefits of globalisation are realised around the world?" and "how can we improve women's healthcare globally?" The best pitches from each state are presented at an online National Finals, from which a junior and senior winner are selected.

EMERGING LEADERS PROGRAM

In January 2022, 30 students participated in the online Emerging Leaders Program. This program focused on Australia's role in Asia. A particular focus was placed on Taiwan, Vietnam and Japan, and delegates were able to engage with a range of expert guest speakers from each of these places via zoom.

YOUTH REPRESENTATIVE PROGRAM

Each year, UN Youth Australia appoints the Australian Youth Representative to the United Nations in partnership with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. The Youth Representative travels around Australia listening to the issues that young people care about, gives a speech on their findings to the United Nations General Assembly and writes a report that is distributed to Australian policymakers and other stakeholders. While the 2021 Listening Tour was unfortunately interrupted by the pandemic, the 2022 Youth Representative Angelica Ojinnaka has begun her consultation and survey process in preparation for her trip to New York in September.



WORLD FEDERATION OF THE UNITED NATIONS ASSOCIATIONS

UNAA is represented at the World Federation of United Nations Associations by Jay Jethwa, who is elected by the general membership of UNAs globally to the WFUNA Executive Committee.

GOVERNANCE

The WFUNA Executive Committee convened its 228th Executive Committee Meeting on 30 May 2022 in Geneva, Switzerland. This was the first face-to-face meeting of the Executive Committee since 2019 due to the pandemic.

The Plenary Assembly was initially scheduled to be held in Tbilisi, Georgia last year (2021). This was re-scheduled to take place in November this year, but the Executive Committee decided that due to the uncertainties surrounding the war in Ukraine, and Tbilisi being in close proximity to the Russian border, the normal business of the Plenary Assembly will be re-arranged in the following manner: it is now split up into 2 parts, the elections component will take place in a hybrid mode, online as well as physical presence, in Geneva on the 7th of November; and all other Plenary agenda items will take place in May 2023 in Tbilisi, again, subject the war situation in Ukraine.

After all appropriate due diligence, Dr Shawn Chen has been nominated by the Executive Committee as the next president of WFUNA. This will be voted upon by the Plenary Assembly (both online as well as in-person) at the Geneva meeting on 7th of November this year. Dr Chen has made two donations to WFUNA: 1) for the establishment of a WFUNA Office in Nairobi, Kenya, and 2) a donation of 250 computers to an educational institution in the Dominican Republic. This is in addition to donating more than USD\$400,000 to WFUNA for its core funding and operations purposes.

OPERATIONS

Most of the WFUNA work is now being conducted at our Geneva office, after the UN HQ was closed due to the pandemic. However, we still occupy the space in New York at the UN Plaza. We may hold our future meeting in New York when the pandemic situation has improved.

The COVID-19 Pandemic has adversely affected the WFUNA members, particularly those from developing economies. The Executive Committee is doing what it can to support such members globally, so that they may continue their active participation in the important work of WFUNA.

WFUNA continues to fundraise online for its programs concerning human rights, youth, education, peace and security, and sustainable development. Applications for funding have been submitted to foundations, governments, corporations, and individuals. In addition, WFUNA works with international fundraising consultants in targeting specific markets globally for our programs.

The work of WFUNA is coordinated by a small cohort of staff, consultants, and interns. The New York Office has a total of two staff and two consultants. Further recruitments are in process. In Seoul, there are two staff currently and eight interns. The Geneva office has five staff and two interns. Three full-time consultants are located outside our offices: in UK, Greece, and Italy.

We now have specific funding to establish a WFUNA office in Africa, in accordance with the 2015 adopted resolution 41/8/B18 on "Strengthening the Role of WFUNA in the African Region" proposed by UNA-South Africa. It is hoped that the WFUNA office will be located in the UN Headquarters in Nairobi. The office will focus on educational programs, capacity-building, and support for UNAs across Africa.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

WFUNA organized a Peace Talk on Ukraine on March 9th for 30+ participants including diplomats, international organization representatives, journalists, and a group of WFUNA Peace Fellows. Another 20 participants from College Leaders at the UN (CLUN) attended virtually. The WFUNA Statement on Ukraine, supported by the Executive Committee and WFUNA Members, including UNA Australia, was read at this meeting.

The panel included the following honoured guests: Counsellor of the Embassy of Ukraine for Seoul, Yana Skybynetska, former ROK Ambassador to Ukraine Lee Yang-goo, former ROK Ambassador to India Shin Bong-kil, senior journalist Mr. Kim Jinho and Dr. Shin Ethan Hee-seok, the legal analyst for the Transitional Justice Working Group.

This year, WFUNA held the 4th and largest UN Security Council Exit Briefing, and two CSO Dialogues with the Presidents of the UNSC. This brings the total to 41 CSO Dialogues we have held since its inception.

The 9th WFUNA College Leaders at the UN: Korea brought together 35 student representatives from 18 universities globally from May to August. Student representatives were challenged to find innovative solutions to topics related to SDGs 11, 13, and 16.

The WFUNA Peace Fellows Programme: in February 2022, we engaged with 28 young scholars, activists, and students from 12 different countries for this program. Due to COVID-19, the program was held online, using Virtual Reality (VR) field trip content and exclusive lectures on Peace agendas and SDG 16.

The WFUNA International Model United Nations (WIMUN) conference scheduled in March 2022 was postponed due to health risks and travel restrictions associated with COVID-19. WFUNA held 5 UN Spotlight Programs with around 100 participants, collaborating with two different partners.

In March, Ms. Maisy Bentley of UNA-New Zealand was selected as WFUNA Young Leader of the Year 2021 for her outstanding work overcoming the challenges of COVID-19 in continuing implementing youth programs. This program is open to nominations from all members, and I will work with the UNAA President to enable UNAA to nominate young Australian leaders in the future.

WFUNA hosted a panel discussion to commemorate the International Day of Sport for Development and Peace in partnership with the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022TM Legacy project, Generation Amazing Foundation (GA Foundation), and the Permanent Mission of Qatar to the UN in Geneva.

The third UN Security Council Election Briefing was held in May for all UNSC candidates seeking election for a non-permanent seat on the Council for the 2023-2024 term. 130 participants were present at these briefings.

16+ Forum: The fourth Annual Showcase was scheduled to take place in San José, Costa Rica in March 2022. However, due to complications within the government there, the decision was made in partnership with the Government of Costa Rica to cancel the event. Planning is now underway for the next annual showcase in a different country to take place in the US spring of 2023. In the meantime, the 16+ Forum with its partners has worked to ensure that SDG16+ remains at the forefront of the international agenda.

This policy framework reiterates our commitment to human rights, and incorporates our UN values – integrity, professionalism and respect for diversity, promotes the wellbeing of all people within our organisation and defines and describes actions and consequences for unwelcome and illegal behaviour. This work will be finalised in 22-23.
